Women's' Crucial Role In Combating Climate Change Monday May 14, 2018

Since the Beijing Women's Conference in 1995, women have been striving for more opportunities to manage natural resources and to safeguard the environment. Today, unequal access to education and health care persists, further reducing women's agency with this issue. As a result, we've seen worsening climate pollution that disproportionately impacts women. Jan Dietrick, founder of Citizens' Climate Lobby Ventura, will speak about women in climate leadership and stewardship, the education of girls as a climate action, climate literacy, and the carbon tax policy designed to help women and other vulnerable communities.

Jan Dietrick was a participant at the US Preparatory Meeting (in Oakland) to the 1995 UN 4th World Conference on Women which is the inspiration for this Women's Forum. Her focus was and continues to be preventing harm from pesticide use. She has a Master's Degree in Public Health. She is a member of the Ventura County Farm Bureau and the Chamber of Commerce. She is the founding Chair of the Ventura Chapter of Citizens' Climate Lobby.

Citizens' Climate Lobby is an international grassroots organization fighting climate change. Political will does not start with politicians but with us. CCL creates political will for climate solutions by enabling individual breakthroughs in the exercise of personal and political power. By building relationships with Congress, CCL seeks bipartisan legislation to reduce greenhouse gases, grow the economy, and save lives.

Topic 3: CHINA AND AMERICA – THE NEW GEOPOLITICAL EQUATION

When: 3:30-5:00pm Friday, March 23, 2018 Where: Leisure Village's Recreation Center (Garden Room)

In the last 15 years, China has implemented a wideranging strategy of economic outreach and expansion of all its national capacities, including military and diplomatic capacities. Where the United States has taken a step back from multilateral trade agreements and discarded the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP), China has made inroads through efforts like the Belt and Road Initiative and the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB). What are Beijing's geopolitical objectives? What leadership and political conditions in each society underlie growing Sino-American tensions? What policies might Washington adopt to address this circumstance?

Our chapter's Great Decisions meetings – **the fourth Friday of each month** -- are informal and invite discussion. First, we read a brief chapter in our booklet. When we meet, we watch a video on the month's topic and then discuss it for about an hour. This is a safe, informative, and non-political venue to discuss important and current foreign policy matters. No experience is necessary.

Public Policy Matters!

March is Women's History Month, a time to celebrate accomplishments of women and focus on the many works yet to be done. AAUW was one of many sponsors for the local screening of the short film "Equal Means Equal," a powerful story of the many ways women in the world struggle for equality in all aspects of life and what work yet needs to be done. The ERA focus of the film notes these words to be amended to the U.S. Constitution – "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." Simple, straight forward, yet not adopted by all states. The film highlights how many intersections exist of social justice being denied and how that impacts millions of women. And it offers ways we can all advocate for adoption of the ERA. The state of California has adopted the resolution to adopt. National AAUW will continue to advocate – stay tuned.

The Federal budget was adopted on February 9th, when the Congress passed and the President signed into law the Bipartisan Budget Act, ensuring government funding for the next two years. The agreement includes the Family First Prevention Services Act; an additional four years of funding (for a total of 10 years) for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP); five years of funding for the Maternal and Infant Early Childhood Visitation Program (MIECHV); two years of funding for Community Health Centers (CHCs); and an historic increase of \$5.8 billion for the Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG). All good news for children and families. Trade-offs were made regarding increased funding for defense, and no decision yet on DACA/Immigration.

The economic disparity for pay equity and equal opportunity in the workplace is still paramount for legislative action. The film mentioned above highlights these issues. As we know, changes in policy are typically done via legislation. What is more difficult to track are the changes made to existing laws via rulemaking. A current focus for AAUW is the Department of Labor's proposed change in rulemaking regarding Tips. Women make up two-thirds of the minimum wage workers nationwide, as well as two-thirds of workers in tipped occupations. The proposed rule change would allow employers to collect and retain the tips of employees who earn the federal minimum wage - \$7.25/hr. as of January. States may have, like California, implemented higher minimum wages. The Tip Rule will impact all workers unless states take a legislative action to negate the rule. Many of us may at one time in our working career held a job that included tipped wages. Those tips may have made the difference in paying the rent. This rule would further expand the gender pay gap and harm women and families. AAUW and many other organizations have sent letters of protest and challenges. Additionally, we still need congressional action on the Paycheck Fairness Act, Pay Equity for All Act and the Fair Pay Act. Again, go to AAUW.org and advocate to stop the Tip rule change!

DEEPER IN DEBT: WOMEN AND STUDENT LOANS

Women take on more student debt than men ... but are paid less after college

Between 1976 and 2014 the price of college attendance more than doubled, but household incomes barely budged. Today most students must bridge the gap between income and cost with student loans—followed by student debt. Women take on more loans and take longer to repay their debt, thus women hold almost twothirds of the outstanding student loan debt in the United States.

Following graduation, women repay their loans more slowly than do men, in part because of the gender pay gap, and they are also more likely to struggle economically during repayment. This means that women may have to put off saving for retirement, buying a home, or starting a business.

Student debt is a systemic and national problem that disproportionately impacts women. AAUW members can help make changes to reduce women's student loan debt burden:

Congress must protect and expand Pell Grants for low-income students to reduce the amount of student loan debt they must take on to complete a degree. State and federal legislators should increase funding for public colleges and universities and support efforts to move toward tuition- and debt-free options for students.

The department of education and lawmakers should make it easier for students to enroll in income-driven repayment options to help mitigate some women's financial difficulties.

Institutions can address the academic and financial needs of traditional and nontraditional students, such as access to child care.

AAUW National News

National Bylaws Amendments:

The AAUW National Board of Directors has voted to put three proposals for bylaws amendments before the membership for a vote this spring. The board strongly supports the proposed amendments that we believe will help keep AAUW vital as an organization and enable us to increase our impact in advancing equity for women and girls.

The proposed amendments address creating three-year staggered board terms, opening board service to those outside of the AAUW membership, and eliminating the degree requirement for membership. While rationale and details for each proposed amendment can be found on the AAUW website, the overarching motivation for these changes at this time is to uphold and advance AAUW's mission and ensure optimal execution at the national board level.

The first two proposals would bring AAUW's board governance structure more in line with nationally accepted nonprofit best practices and the needs of the organization. The third proposal — to eliminate the degree requirement for membership — has come before the membership for vote a number of times. The board feels strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now perceived by many as counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

The board recognizes that we have not traditionally put proposals up for vote outside our AAUW National Election, but these proposed changes have been under consideration for several years by both the Governance Committee and the board, and we believe it is important to move forward without delay to position the organization for greater growth.

Members can comment on the proposed amendments and submit their own proposals from February 22, 2018, through March 22, 2018, at 11:59 p.m. ET. Voting will open on April 25, 2018, and close June 9, 2018, at 9 p.m. ET.

We encourage you all to engage in respectful debate that has always been a hallmark of the AAUW community, exercise your vote, and encourage fellow members to do the same.
