## IBC Luncheon in February

We still have a massive gender pay gap in this country. Women make, at best, 80 cents on the dollar to men. That number decreases for women of color, with Hispanic women earning the least per dollar as white men in the same job.

This year's IBC luncheon highlighted ways to bridge that gap, including AAUW programs for financial literacy and salary negotiation (see next page for details): *Money Trek* for high school and college students; *Start Smart* for college students; and *Work Smart* for people in the workforce.

## AAUW Financial Literacy Program Summary

AAUW-CA's Financial Literacy Program consists of three different projects that cover the entire spectrum of basic financial literacy: **Money Trek**, **Start Smart**, and **Work Smart**.

**Money Trek:** AAUW-CA created Money Trek to teach high school and college students the basics of personal finances. This A to Z program covers the personal financial decisions people typically make through different stages of their lives. Money Trek consists of six+ modules accompanied by handouts in workbook form and includes examples and exercises, as well as lists of other resources. The modules are geared toward grade levels from high school to college.

- Modules 1 and 2 **Budgeting and Banking**. The basics for high school students.
- Modules 3 & 4A and 4B: **Credit and Borrowing**, and **How to Pay for College**. Great for high school students and students entering college.
- Modules 5 & 6: **Save, Invest** and **Buying a Home**. Geared toward students in the last two years of college.

**Start Smart:** In conjunction with personal money management, the **Start Smart** Campus initiative is a perfect fit for college juniors and seniors approaching the job market. It provides students with the knowledge and skills needed to negotiate salaries and benefits and receive fair and realistic compensation. The topics include:

- The personal consequences of the gender wage gap
- Resources for benchmarking reasonable salaries and benefits
- Negotiation skills and how to aim high yet be realistic
- Knowing the bottom line and how to develop a "bare bones" budget.

**Money Trek** and **Start Smart** programs are designed to work hand-in-hand to prepare young women for a successful financial future.

**Work Smart:** A two-hour salary and benefits negotiation workshop for working women, the curriculum demonstrates the impact and consequences of the gender pay gap and teaches participants to articulate their value, perform objective salary research and prepare a persuasive negotiation strategy. The workshop concludes with a practice exercise. While the primary target is working women, men may also attend.

### **Topic 2 – The Middle East: Regional Disorder**

*As the presidency of Donald J. Trump passes the halfway point, the Middle East remains a region in turmoil. The Trump administration has aligned itself with strongmen in Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and Egypt, which along with Israel have a common goal of frustrating Iranian expansion. What will be the fallout from policy reversals such as withdrawing from the Iranian nuclear accord and moving the U.S. embassy in Israel to Jerusalem? Does the United States see a path forward in troubled states such as Syria, Yemen, Libya and Iraq? Is the United States headed toward war with Iran?*

Our chapter's Great Decisions meetings – **the fourth Friday of each month** – are informal and invite discussion. First, we read a brief chapter in our booklet. When we meet, we watch a short video on the month's topic and then discuss it for about an hour. ## Public Policy Matters

### LET THE SAUSAGE MAKING BEGIN!

As the newly elected House of Representatives take their seats and start the legislative process, and as our State Legislators submit their bills for this next cycle, the “sausage making” begins! The broad subject areas at the Federal level include women’s economic security, veterans, national infrastructure needs, and some stronger measures for gun control. The bills have a lengthy committee process and will be below the radar, especially with all the air in Washington being taken up by the pending investigations on the administration. Our Congresswoman Brownley and Senators Feinstein and Harris have initiated and resurrected bills for further control on guns in response to the tragic Borderline shooting and will need our support as these bills move forward. We will continue to track.

California Governor Gavin Newsom’s State Budget proposes programs to address the need for Universal Pre-School/Early Childhood Education and 6 months of paid family leave – designating \$500 million to the measures. His family-friendly agenda should help to advance AAUW goals. The California State legislators have submitted their bills for this session, which also have a lengthy committee process to make it through for signing in May. Here’s a few to follow:

#### Sexual harassment:

Jackson – SB493 Title IX: This bill would require an institution of higher education that receives state funds, including funds for student financial assistance, to comply with requirements relating to the protection of students from, and providing students with procedural protections relating to complaints of, sexual harassment, including requiring the governing board or body of each of these institutions to (1) disseminate a notice of nondiscrimination to each employee and volunteer; (2) designate at least one employee of the institution to act as a gender equity officer; (3) adopt rules and procedures for the prevention of sexual harassment; (4) adopt and publish on its internet website grievance procedures providing for the prompt and equitable resolution of sexual harassment complaints; (5) publish on the institution’s internet website the name, title, and contact information for the gender equity officer and any individual official with the authority to investigate complaints or to institute corrective measures, as specified; (6) include specified training to each employee engaged in the grievance procedure; (7) include annual trauma-informed training for resident life student and nonstudent staff for handling reports regarding incidents of sexual harassment or assault at an institution with on-campus housing; and (8) adopt and publish on the institution’s internet website investigation procedures for student sexual harassment complaints. This bill would impose a state-mandated local program.



## Public Policy Matters

Gun control: Irwin AB 12, previously introduced, is symbolic of the 12 victims of the Borderline tragedy on November 7th, 2018. The bill was amended to make restraining orders a more efficient and reliable tool for law enforcement by: (1) allowing for the simultaneous approval of a search warrant for firearms and ammunition when a restraining order is issued; (2) extending the default prohibition for notice and hearing orders from one to five years; and (3) clarifying that there is no 24-hour grace period for temporary emergency orders that would enable owners to hide, sell, transfer, or even use their firearm instead of handing it over to law enforcement. Irwin AB 339 addresses the lack of awareness of restraining orders by requiring local law enforcement agencies to create policies and standards for their own departmental use of such orders. Irwin AB 340 creates a grant program for local jurisdictions to investigate and remove weapons from prohibited persons. California law makes it illegal for those who have previously been convicted of a felony or violent misdemeanor, as well as persons experiencing mental health crises or narcotics addiction, to possess firearms. A persistent backlog of 10,000+ subjects in the state's Armed Prohibited Persons System (APPS), which tracks these subjects and is administered by the California Department of Justice, highlights the importance of engaging local peace officers with on-the-ground knowledge of their community.

Our Federal and State AAUWs continue to work on priorities for pay equity, fairness in employment opportunities, strengthening retirement benefits/pension viability for women, protecting social security, financial literacy training, career development and work-life balance. All these areas intersect legislation, funding and advocacy. So, stay tuned and stay engaged!
