Celebrating Women in History!

This year, students in 11 area schools celebrated Women's History month with the annual Camarillo AAUW "Women in History" program. In addition to committee members Ann Kahng, Jan Demonsy, Judi Gill, Cheryl Mastrovito, Betsy Metzgar, Karen Normington, Janice Lindsay and Merrill Berge, each school's Women in History representative helped to recruit and coordinate over 70 volunteers for this annual event.

Moms, aunts and grandmothers portrayed 12 important women with first-person performances, helping to make history come alive right in front of students' eyes. Approximately 10,000 area K-8 students saw at least one of the following:

- Sally Kristen Ride (Grades K-3) First American woman to go into space.
- Mae Jemison (Grades K-3) First African American woman to be an astronaut, also scientist and doctor.
- Maria Tallchief (Grades K-3) First Prima Ballerina as well as first Native American prima ballerina
- Pocahontas (Grades K-3) Native American heroine. Helped establish Jamestown Colony
- Amelia Earhart (Grades K-8) A pioneering aviator who paved the way for women to become commercial and military pilots as well as astronauts. She was the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic.
- Maria Echaveste (Grades K-8) An attorney and former Presidential advisor at the White House who grew up in Oxnard working in the strawberry fields with her family.
- Julia Morgan (Grades 4-8) First woman licensed in California as an architect. Designed Hearst Castle and introduced the concept of reinforced concrete.
- Susan B. Anthony (Grades 4-8) Championed women's right to vote; was arrested and jailed when she cast a vote in 1872.
- Deborah Samson (1760-1827) (Grades 5 or 4-5) Disguised herself as a man and served as a soldier in the Revolutionary War
- Queen Hatshepsut (18th Dynasty) (Grade 6 only) First and only woman pharaoh of Egypt.
- Queen Elizabeth I (1533-1603) (Grade 7 only) Queen of England during Renaissance period.
- Clara Barton (1821-1912) and the Civil War (Grade 8 only) During the Civil War she distributed supplies to the battlefields and nursed the sick and wounded. Founded the American Red Cross.

Great Decisions

Nuclear Negotiations: Back to the Future?

Friday, April 26th, 3:30-5:00 p.m. Leisure Village's Recreation Center (Garden Room)

Nuclear weapons have not gone away, and the Trump administration has brought a new urgency, if not a new approach, to dealing with them. The President has met with Vladimir Putin as the New Start Treaty with Russia comes up for renewal in 2021, the first presidential summit ever with Kim Jong-un occurred to discuss denuclearizing the Korean Peninsula, and President Trump has decertified the Obama nuclear deal with Iran. To what degree should past nuclear talks guide future U.S. nuclear arms control negotiations? Can the art of the deal apply to stabilizing our nuclear future?

Our chapter's Great Decisions meetings – the fourth Friday of each month – are informal and invite discussion. First, we read a brief chapter in our booklet. When we meet, we watch a short video on the month's topic and then discuss it for about an hour. This is a safe, informative, and non-political venue to discuss important and current foreign policy matters. No experience is necessary!

Public Policy Matters

Closing the Gap - April is Equal Pay Month

In 1945 the Women's Equality Bill, the first Federal Pay Equity legislation was introduced by AAUW member Rep. Chase Going Woodhouse (D-CT). In 1963 the Equal Pay Act became law. Going forward various bills were introduced, but they are yet to be passed. President Obama signed an Executive Order in 2014, the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, only to be rescinded by the current administration. This left it to the states to step up and pass laws, such as last year, when California passed Senator Hannah Beth Jackson's California Fair Pay Act SB358, protecting women in the workforce.

In this state, as of 2016 the earnings ratio exists of 88% differential between men and women, with an even larger gap for women of color. Nationwide the gap still hovers around 80 cents for every dollar a male worker earns. The consequences of this disparity impacts women, families and the long-term health of every community. Research has found that 42 percent of mothers with children under the age of 18 are their families' primary or sole breadwinners. Making ends meet, creating a future for their families, is substantially impaired by this pay inequity. Clearly the gap still exists! Congress must act on bills such as the Paycheck Fairness Act, the Pay Equity for All Act, and the Fair Pay Act — all vehicles to advance equity for all women in the workforce. Let them know by tracking the AAUW 2-Minute Advocacy calls to action!

Our State legislatures have been busy, with all bill submittal closing on February 22nd. They are now starting the 30-day laborious process of committee(s) review and action. Here are a few bills we are tracking here in California: SB-534/Bradford – requires insurance companies writing more than \$100 million in premiums to file reports on their investment in women/minority owned business and the diversity of their Corporate Boards; AB-271/Cooper & Burke, along with SB-171/Jackson – would require the State Dept. of Human Resources to evaluate Civil Service classifications and prepare reports every two years on the gender/ethnicity pay equity, where there exists an underrepresentation of women and minorities, and to prepare a plan if a discrepancy is found; AB-798/Burke – Child Poverty – proposes to take the findings from the task force work "Lifting Children and Families out of Poverty" and implement the recommendations – more on that to come.


All these bills can be tracked at http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/. Bottom line, the gap still exists, and it's only through advocacy and leadership that we will continue to bring parity for all women in the workforce.
