

Thanks to AAUW member Dr. Colleen Robertson, Superintendent of Somis School, for hosting our meeting, which included viewing the 2019 Oscar winner for Best Documentary Short, "Period. End of Sentence" about Indian women who fight the stigma surrounding menstruation and begin manufacturing sanitary pads.

We discussed the stigma women face about menstruation around the world. On a local level, we discussed how sex ed and menstrual hygiene are addressed from middle school through college, how schools ensure girls' reliable and unashamed access to pads and tampons, and what steps we can take to help. Viewings and discussions like these are a start. Consider donations of pads or tampons to the food bank. Nicole Mones – A newly launched textile business took Mones to China in 1977, after the end of the cultural revolution. She traded textiles with China for 18 years before she turned to writing about that country in the form of novels, nonfiction, and articles about Chinese cuisine. She is a member of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations.

Paddy Hirsch – A supervising editor at NPR by day, Hirsch is a fiction and nonfiction author, journalist, web video host, financial blogger, and a commentator on the economy and financial markets. He was a 2014 winner of the Edward R. Murrow award for excellence in reporting.

Diane Mautner – Diane Mautner is an author, playwright, and speech and language specialist by trade. She has written three books, one being the acclaimed, fabulously illustrated, children's book *Prisoner #147* about a mischievous raccoon — an exciting adventure from beginning to end.

Nonfiction Book Group

Our June book will be *Earning the Rockies: How Geography Shapes America's Role in the World* by Robert D. Kaplan. We will meet at 10:00 a.m. on June 11th at Anita Roll's house.

In *Earning the Rockies*, Kaplan undertakes his own cross-country journey to recapture an appreciation of American geography often lost in the jet age. Kaplan reminds us of an overlooked source of American strength: the fact that we are a nation, empire, and continent all at once. Earning the Rockies is an urgent reminder of how a nation's geography still foreshadows its future.

Our July book will be *The Drowned and The Saved* by Primo Levy. We will meet at 10:00 a.m. on July 9th. The host is yet to be decided.

In his final book before his death, Primo Levi returns once more to his time at Auschwitz in a moving meditation on memory, resiliency, and the struggle to comprehend unimaginable tragedy. Levi breaks his book into eight essays, ranging from topics like the unreliability of memory to how violence twists both the victim and the victimizer. He debunks the myth that most of the Germans were in the dark about the Final Solution or that Jews never attempted to escape the camps. As the Holocaust recedes into the past and fewer and fewer survivors are left to tell their stories, *The Drowned and the Saved* is a vital first-person testament.

Great Decisions

Decoding U.S.-China Trade Friday, June 28th, 3:30-5:00 p.m. Leisure Village's Recreation Center (Garden Room)

Though arguably the most advanced economy in the world, the United States still uses centuries-old numbers to measure trade. These antique numbers mangle understanding of the U.S.-China trade relationship, shrinking America's true economic size and competitiveness, while swelling China's. Bad numbers give rise to bad policies that ultimately kill U.S. jobs and cede market share to China. What other tools can the United States employ to counter China's unfair trade practices? There are several available, yet they remain mostly unused.

Cyber Conflict and Geopolitics

Friday, July 26th, 3:30-5:00 p.m. Leisure Village's Recreation Center (Garden Room)

Cyber conflict is a new and continually developing threat, which can include foreign interference in elections, industrial sabotage and attacks on infrastructure. Russia has been accused of interfering in the 2016 presidential elections in the United States and China is highly committed to using cyberspace as a tool of national policy. Dealing with cyber conflict will require new ways of looking at 21st century warfare. Is the United States prepared to respond to such threats?

Our chapter's Great Decisions meetings – **the fourth Friday of each month** -- are informal and invite discussion. First, we read a brief chapter in our booklet. When we meet, we watch a 20-minute video on the month's topic and then discuss it for about an hour. This is a safe, informative, and non-political venue to discuss important and current foreign policy matters. No experience is necessary! CHOICE – RAISE YOUR VOICE!

AAUW supports the right of every woman to safe, accessible, affordable, and comprehensive family planning and reproductive health services. This position stems from AAUW's Public Policy Priorities, which advocate "to guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society. AAUW supports choice in the determination of one's reproductive life . . . increased access to quality, affordable health care and family planning services, including expansion of patient rights."

Republicans in the U.S. House and Senate have undertaken several efforts to threaten women's health care, and it is anticipated that more will be attempted, especially reducing funding for Planned Parenthood, which primarily provides routine health services for women and men. Efforts to impede women's health care decisions are unconstitutional and undermine the important role doctors play in helping women make decisions about their reproductive health.

Most recently, six states have signed into law the "heart-beat" 6-week abortion limitation (Georgia, Ohio, Mississippi, Kentucky, Iowa and North Dakota), which virtually removes a woman's decision-making about her pregnancy. This is primed to go to the U.S. Supreme Court and will be the test of the governing nearly 50-yr. old Roe v. Wade decision. If you wish to stand up to defend a woman's right to choose for herself, now is the time to write your legislative leaders and other members of Congress nationwide and to participate in local rallies/movements to raise your voice. We will watch for expansion of this type of legislation to other states.

CONTACT INFO: To reach your California senators, visit <u>www.Harris.Senate.Gov</u> and <u>www.feinstein.senate.gov</u>, which take you to their contact pages to submit comments directly. As this issue builds, advocacy is imperative to reach out to both sides of the aisle to create pressure. <u>Planned Parenthood</u> is a good site to advocate for/with. And here's <u>a list of other organizations</u> if you wish to support women in the states that have enacted the 6-week heart-beat legislation.

As the Beacon goes dark for the summer, look for e-mail blasts to keep informed on these issues we are tracking:

- o Status on Gun Shows at the Fairgrounds;
- o Local support needed for the Oxnard Performing Arts Center and Carnegie Museum;
- o Legislative actions from Sacramento; and
- o Continuing national issues in Washington D.C. such as the issue above.

The Public Policy committee will work on timelier advocacy opportunities for members as the legislative and policy items evolve. E-mail blasts, writing to our elected representatives, appearing at hearings – these things do make a difference. It's important that we step up and engage on issues important to us.
