A Message from Jan Demonsy

Gloria and I are happy to report that the August Planning Meeting was a successful collaboration of "great minds" joining to evaluate progress on last year's Planning Meeting goals and brainstorm about new targets for 2019-2020. The past year's goals focused on getting out the vote (GOTV), revamping communication/marketing materials, fundraising, and engaging with Cal State University Channel Islands. As a group, we all deserve a pat on the back! Progress was made toward each.

In particular, we "rocked" at GOTV activities with voter registration volunteers, postcard parties, "womaning" the polls and marching for causes. Six members ran for office, three successfully, and one is currently running for County Supervisor. We also revamped our marketing materials; the new tri-fold flyer succinctly explains our AAUW mission, branch activities and opportunities for learning and socializing. We appeared at community events and hosted three summer gatherings for existing and new members.

For the new 2019-20 objectives, separate groups focused on: Programs, Membership, Advocacy and Fundraising. In Programs, GOTV continues to be a focus, as does the 2020 Census and the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage.. Women's health in mind, body and spirit was also discussed. The Membership group generated two ideas to help initiate new members – new member packets and a new member survey – both ideas were promptly staffed by volunteers. The Advocacy group discussed tracking legislative bills, visiting legislators and posting representatives' ratings. Ideas generated by the Fundraising group included corporate sponsors, a silent auction, an eat-out fundraiser and a yard sale.

More great news!! We have a new Camarillo location for our four General Meetings in 2019-20. Our Programs Chair made a deal with the director of Studio Channel Islands Art Center on Ventura Boulevard. It is a large venue with frequently changing art exhibitions. Further, our four General Meetings in October, February, April and May will be scheduled on the first Monday of each month so you can calendar them now.

Finally, is it just me, or is anyone else surprised it's already September? Life seems to fly by, but the fall season is a special one. As one anonymous wise person said, "Autumn shows us how beautiful it is to let things go." So, we have a great "letting go" opportunity for all of you. 

Gender Alone Is Not Enough

A 2014 study by the Level Playing Field Institute found that low-income high school girls of color (Black and Latina/x) in a challenging STEM program felt racial barriers were greater obstacles than gender-based barriers to pursuing tech and other STEM careers. And, they weren't wrong. More and more women are pursuing STEM careers, but racial and ethnic minority groups are still grossly underrepresented.

Minority groups are underrepresented in the workforce across America, and they face challenges and discrimination their white peers do not. At work, women of color experience a greater wage gap; rarely hold leadership positions; are more likely to experience workplace harassment; and are often presumed to be less qualified despite their credentials and performance. And, discrimination is not limited to the workplace but occurs in the areas of education, healthcare, housing, voter rights, childcare, economic security, and more.



Women are diverse, and we are defined by more than our gender. On top of gender are layers of race, ethnicity, sexuality, age, class, nationality, mental and physical ability, financial status and more. The way in which these layers interact and are compounded, shaping the discrimination and oppression we face individually as women, is called

"intersectionality." Sexism, racism and other -isms are not experienced separately in a silo. If I'm a black woman, I have some disadvantages because I'm a woman and some disadvantages because I'm black. But I also have some disadvantages specifically because I'm a black woman, which neither black men nor white women must deal with.

A singular focus on one identity — gender — detracts from our ability to solve broader systemic problems, correct biases and obstacles, and ensure an equal playing field for all. "Intersectional feminism" calls on us to be intentional about taking time to learn about experiences that are different from our own, encouraging each unique voice to be heard and validated.

As an organization, when we discuss the needs of women, we must include the perspectives of ALL women. "AAUW supports efforts to improve racial, ethnic, and gender justice and will work to eradicate intersectional bias as well. This includes creating a diverse culture of involvement, respect, inclusion and connection, where the richness of ideas, backgrounds and perspectives is fully appreciated and utilized." (2019-2020 AAUW Public Policy Priorities). To that end, AAUW Camarillo is hosting "Empowering Latinas" panel discussion at our October 7th general meeting. Details on the next page.

Learning about others' experiences and examining the workings of our society, even if it feels uncomfortable sometimes, equips us to better understand and solve systemic problems. At the end of the day, being an advocate for equity and equality for ALL women and girls requires curiosity, compassion, and continual introspection. In many ways, it's an ongoing conversation with yourself in understanding how your own multiple identities shape who you are and how you show up in the world.

Public Good, not Public Charge Kathy Long, Public Policy Chair

Emma Lazarus, wrote "The New Colossus" honoring the Statute of Liberty:

Not like the brazen giant of Greek fame,
With conquering limbs astride from land to land;
Here at our sea-washed, sunset gates shall stand
A mighty woman with a torch, whose flame
Is the imprisoned lightning, and her name
Mother of Exiles. From her beacon-hand
Glows world-wide welcome; her mild eyes command
The air-bridged harbor that twin cities frame.

"Keep, ancient lands, your storied pomp!" cries she With silent lips. "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!"

The phrase "Give me...." has raised lots of discourse nationwide, challenging our long-founded "open doors" to immigrants, searching out a better life, and eventually becoming the fabric of the American way of life. The White House/Administration has taken "rule change" administratively to circumvent the legislative process from open discussion and debate. The most recent one is proposed through the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) is: Inadmissibility on Public Charge Grounds. This changes the 1996 rule and would expand the definition of Public Charge, adding new negative factors that would be considered when a federal official considers immigration status. Under the rule, if an immigrant is here LEGALLY, applies for or receives certain federal non-cash benefits they are legally eligible to receive, i.e. food stamps, health care, federally subsidized housing, Medi-Cal, their immigrant status could be challenged and extension refused. Public Charge policies have been fought many times. In 1996 the federal act codified the public charge factors that had been in place for many years and were reaffirmed again in 1999. This proposed new policy would also add a complex set of income and demographic factors in determining public charge: consideration of age, English proficiency, and disability. So, who will feel the pain from this change —children and families here legally! Worse health outcomes, including increased prevalence of obesity and malnutrition, especially for pregnant or breastfeeding women, infants or children, and increased rates of poverty could be the negative impacts of this rule on our communities. The safety net of care for our poorest members of our communities would collapse.

Economic impacts would be felt with this rule change, in reduced use of food stamps —for every \$1 of benefits, generates \$1.79 in local economy —estimates from U.S. Dept of Agriculture. Jobs would be loss from the reduction of federal benefits utilized and there would be a decrease in state and local revenues. There would be an additional administrative burden by local governments in tracking the changes.

Over decades we have learned that our community is safer, healthier and more robust when we help all those in need, especially our children. This rule is on track to go into effect mid-October. Our state association of counties, County Welfare Directors, County Health Executives Association of CA and the CA Association of Public Hospitals and Health Systems have all gone on record opposing this policy change. Again, this was generated from DHS without legislative hearings or public transparency! Two California counties have filed lawsuits to date. You can let your voice be heard by sending emails to Congresswoman Julia Brownley at juliabrownley@house.gov An administrative rule change this significant removes true democracy from our leaders and communities.
