A Message from Jan Demonsy, Co-President

Dear Members,

Have you noticed that the succinct AAUW tag line "Empowering Women Since 1881" contains some remarkable information? Not only has our organization weathered 138 years, it was founded by prescient women who believed in "empowerment" long before that concept became a popular social or political catch phrase. Moreover, the founders sought to empower other women despite holding few of the powerful rights women have today. They stood stalwart and are worthy of today's empowerment quotes such as, "A strong woman stands up for herself; a stronger woman stands up for everyone else". They clearly knew, "When women support each other, incredible things happen."

Speaking of empowered women, an historical mark for women occurred just last month. On October 18, 2019, two female astronauts carried out NASA's first all-female spacewalk. That's "One giant leap for Womenkind" – should we deem it a landmark in "herstory"? This event certainly demonstrates the expansion of STEM careers for women. While women still have a ways to go, especially in wage equality, each watershed event creates a step in the right direction. AAUW supports the empowerment of young women to reach their educational dreams. Empowerment is contagious because "empowered women empower women."

Thanks to our Programs VP, Bea Lutterbeck, we were treated to a superb panel discussion, Empowering Latinas, with four women making a difference in our community: Michelle Hasendonckx, Martita Martinez-Bravo, Teresa Amescua-Smith and Adrienne Arguijo. The discussion provided an authentic look into social biases they have encountered, as well as the strengths and resilience of the Latinx community. It was an opportunity for me to truly empathize with other women while, at the same time, realize there's no authentic way to "walk in her shoes".

We're also happy to report a recent fundraising success. On October 10, 2019, board members Vanessa Otto and Bea Lutterbeck were notified that our AAUW Branch was chosen as the recipient of the 2020 Rebozo Festival grant award of \$5,000. The Rebozo Board noted our branch is "in the front line of addressing the cultural needs of the community." Attempts were made in prior years for this grant; however, this year's interview with the Rebozo Board included a short video of a Tech Trekker joyfully coding at her computer. 

Public Policy

This month's Public Policy Committee article focuses on just a few of the bills signed into state law. AAUW member Pat Ehret has been following SB-328: In consideration of the established effect of sleep deprivation on adolescents and the resulting benefits of a later school start time, the California legislature has passed, and Governor Newsom on October 13th has signed, SB-328. As a result of this bill, the school day for middle school and high school students, including students at charter schools, will begin no earlier than 8:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. respectively. The bill goes into effect by July 1, 2022, or the date on which a school district's or charter school's collective bargaining agreement that is operative on January 1, 2020, expires, whichever is later, except for rural school districts. Costs determined to be mandated by the state will be reimbursed pursuant to statutory provisions. So, sleep in kids!

On the other end of the spectrum, our seniors, we have several items of interest. Senate Bill 228/Hannah Beth Jackson provides a policy framework for the Master Plan for Aging and Disabled Californians, established through executive order by Newsom. SB 228 encourages collaboration among state departments and stakeholders, provides a framework of values, builds on best practices and research to provide a vision and plan for addressing the long- and short-term needs of aging and disabled Californians, and requires reporting to the Legislature on the progress of the plan.

By 2030, our older population will nearly double in California, bringing an increase of 4 million people over the age of 65. Newsom recently signed two other Jackson bills aimed at addressing the needs of California's elder population:

SB280 (Jackson) strengthens home building standards to help aging and disabled adults reduce their risk of dangerous falls and allow them to age at home. And, SB623 directs the Department of Housing and Community Development to use the most current census data to determine the assistance that is directed for the construction of low-income senior housing units. This helps ensure that housing allocations accurately reflect California's increasing senior population. Send thanks to Senator Jackson at SD19.senate.ca.gov.

If universal health care is a national goal, we must get the cost of health care under control. One significant area of cost is with prescription drugs. AARP's Stop Rx Greed Campaign advocates for outlawing pay-for-delay agreements as one of the key pillars to convince state and federal lawmakers to act to lower the high costs of prescription drugs. So far in 2019, 25 states have enacted 38 bills to attack this problem. The measures include authorizing the importation of lower-priced medicines from Canada and other countries, laws governing price transparency and the creation of drug affordability councils.

Governor Newsom showed support for the AARP campaign and signed a law which takes effect January 1, 2020. It is designed to deter companies from paying competitors to delay creating and selling less expensive generic equivalents of their brand-name medications. It shifts the burden so that instead of the state having to prove that these deals illegally inhibit competition, the drug makers will have to show that the agreements are legitimate. This is a first law that puts the drug makers on report!

AAUW works closely with our partner organizations that advocate to improve the quality of life for all members of our communities, from our youngest to our wise ones.

To honor recently passed Representative Elijah Cummings, "Our children are the living messengers we send to a future we will never see..." All of us must work for a better future.
