Dear Members, The green sprouts of springtime are popping up in full bloom to brighten the world and lush landscapes are rising once more. After the trying times with COVID-19, we'll need to focus on revitalizing life and creating a personal renewal of ourselves and the things we missed so dearly. Many of us may have used the barren months of quarantine to rethink goals or recycle memories. Since education comes in many forms, women without degrees can still be strong advocates. Finally, AAUW must evolve to survive. Let's all give this proposal some thought.

Last month Ventura County Supervisor Carmen Ramirez presented the Board of Supervisors with a resolution to declare March 24, 2021 as Equal Pay Day and recognizing March 2021 as Maggie Erickson Kildee and Susan K. Lacey Women's History Month, as they were the first women to serve as supervisors. AAUW Camarillo Branch spoke to acknowledge the Board's acceptance of this resolution (inside). There's still much to do toward pay equity, but we are grateful for the recognition, including for longtime member Maggie Kildee.

Finally, more really good news! We've planned June 6, 2021 as our first outdoor meeting In Person. The chosen site is the Historical Society with its lovely gazebo. It's a "bring your own beverage" event and we we'll need to wear masks, but just the thought of actually seeing each other is wonderful. Please, let's all cross our fingers!

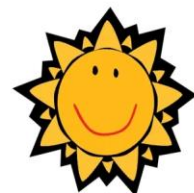

Brexit and the European Union

With the “Brexit transition period” coming to an end this year, the United Kingdom will formally leave the European Union at the start of 2021. With negotiations between the two entities continuing to stall, what does the future of Europe and the UK look like? Will the UK survive a possible Scottish vote to leave? Who will step up and take command of Europe now that Angela Merkel is out of the spotlight?

Are you curious about how foreign policy takes shape? You can learn more with the AAUW Great Decisions group. Our chapter’s Great Decisions meetings – the fourth Friday of each month – are informal and invite discussion. First, before the meeting, at home, we read a brief chapter in our booklet and watch a 20-minute video on the month’s topic. I will be communicating with you via email with information about the video disc for viewing at home. On the meeting day and time, we sign into the GoToMeeting website and discuss the topic for about an hour. Authors’ Day, Nov. 6, 2021

We hope you are planning to join us on **Nov 6, 2021** when we celebrate the return of our fabulous fundraiser and get together with friends we haven’t seen for quite a long while. We will be moving the event this year to Spanish Hills Country Club, where they have a new Chef (we are told he is excellent!). A couple of us will be doing a taste test soon. So, please put the date on your calendar, and join us again this year for the worthy cause of our scholarship fund.

Public Policy – AAUW Lobby Day! Public Policy Chair, Kathy Long

AAUW California Lobby Day was March 24th and Betsy Metzgar, Pat Ehret and I participated along with over 120 AAUW members statewide. Starting with a training webinar prior to the day, we learned what the priority bills are for AAUW CA. The day then started with a presentation from Assembly Majority Leader, Eloise Reyes and Chair of the Assembly Women’s’ Caucus Cristina Garcia. They spoke to the priorities for the Caucus, released the following day: Workplace Equity-SB 62; Gender Equity, AB 1287 –known as the “pink tax” –higher prices placed on goods sold to women; Health & Safety – AB 124, AB 925, SB 352; Protecting Vulnerable Communities, AB 14; SB 4; and AB 1225; and Addressing Poverty, AB 27. More about these bills next month as they work through Committees.

Our Lobby Day mission focused on: AB92/Co-Sponsored by AAUW CA and Assemblymember Eloise Gomez; the bill addressed Child Care Family Fees. This bill would waive family fees, using Federal funding, through Oct. 31, 2022, on an equitable sliding scale. The average 2-parent family spends around 20% of their annual income on childcare. Experts say that spending more than 7% places economic stress on working families. Over the year of the pandemic, 2000 childcare homes and 400 childcare centers have closed. The economic impact to women has been dramatic. By increasing the affordability to childcare for families, the economy will move to stabilize.

Senate Bill 62 – Garment Worker Protection Act, authored by Senator Maria Elena Durazo would expand and strengthen enforcement of wage theft liability in the garment manufacturing industry. By eliminating the “piece rate”, while still allowing for bonus and incentive payments, this bill will ensure that workers are paid for ALL TIME spent working. Just in Los Angeles, 2,000 garment manufacturers employ more than 46,000 people, mostly immigrant women, who spend 10-12 hours a day cutting, sewing and dyeing clothing. Paying by the piece equates to an average of \$5.15 an hour. This bill would also expand liability for wage violations.

The third bill we lobbied for was Senate Bill 373, by Senator Dave Min: Consumer Debt: Economic Abuse. This bill would prohibit creditors and debt collectors from being able to collect from an individual when that individual can demonstrate the debt was incurred through economic abuse. It would also prevent the debt from being reported to credit agencies. It basically focuses on survivors of domestic violence, elder or dependent adult abuse, and foster youth. 99% of domestic violence cases where financial abuse occurs, are women.

Our group met with Alchemy Nikole Graham, assistant to Assemblymember Steve Bennett. We introduced her to AAUW, some of our projects, the bills we were there to lobby, and to ask for his support. Our other State representatives from our county weren't available to meet but will receive the information. Overall, successful day!

Quick update on the work to increase Broadband Access to underserved communities throughout Ventura county: On March 16th, the County Board of Supervisors adopted a Resolution that speaks to the need for greater Broadband access, demonstrated during this pandemic, and the opportunities for grant funding from state/federal government. The County Information Technology Services Department, in collaboration with the Broadband Consortium, has identified possible major alignments for fiber installation: one using State Route 126 right-of-way, and the other using a combination of State Route 118, Santa Rosa Road 23 and State Route 23 rights-of-way. These routes might combine with existing fiber networks to better serve the county. This resolution and work will be woven into grant applications to the CPUC at the state for funding opportunities. Stay tuned!

March 2021 Proclamation

**Ventura County Board of Supervisors Proclaiming March 2021
Maggie Erickson Kildee and Susan K. Lacey Women's History Month and
March 24, 2021 as Equal Pay Day**

Whereas, Ventura County residents will join women and men around the world during the month of March to celebrate National Women's History Month, observed under the 2021 National theme, "Valiant Women of the Vote: Refusing to be Silenced," honoring the extraordinary and often unrecognized determination and tenacity of women. Against social convention, and often legal restraints, women have created a legacy that expands the frontiers of possibility for generations to come; and,

Whereas, in 2013, by declaring every March Women's History Month, it was established that March would hold a particular significance to Ventura County residents as the Ventura County Board of Supervisor's named Women's History Month in Ventura County in honor of two pioneering women, County Supervisors Maggie Erickson Kildee and Susan K. Lacey; and,

Whereas, the recognition of Women's History Month continues to pay tribute to Maggie Erickson Kildee and Susan K. Lacey, the first two women elected to the Ventura County Board of Supervisors. Their path to and within public service established a strong precedent for future generations of women to strive to attain; and,

Whereas, women have and continue to be important and vital participants in the economic, cultural, and social fabric of our community, working inside and outside of the home, and by promoting new generations of women leaders who will weave their colorful stories into history; and,

Whereas, Equal Pay Day was first observed in 1996 by the National Committee on Pay Equity as a public awareness event to illustrate the gap between men's and women's wages. In 1963 women earned 59 cents for every dollar that a man made, in 1992 it was 77 cents, and currently it's 82 cents. That is the average for all women; the wage gap is even greater for most women of color; and,

Whereas, the next Equal Pay Day is March 24, which symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. Women's pay affects not only their current income but their future circumstances as well. It affects how much they are able to save, and it determines the amount of Social Security for which they will be eligible; and,

Whereas, the County of Ventura is proud to recognize the contributions of exemplary women in our community and encourages all of our local women's organizations to continue to work towards electing more female representation into public office, retaining and advancing women's rights, and resolving the inequities that women still face today.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Ventura County Board of Supervisors hereby celebrates March as Maggie Erickson Kildee and Susan K. Lacey Women's History Month in Ventura County and March 24, 2021 as Equal Pay Day.

Since 1888, AAUW has been one of the largest funders of women's graduate education, investing in women who go on to change the world, funding the educations of countless women so they could follow their dreams. From astronauts to zoologists, the recipients of AAUW's fellowships, grants and awards represent nearly every imaginable field of endeavor. Overall, we've given more than \$115 million to over 13,000 women and nonprofit organizations around the world. Our recipients include some of the most influential voices of the past two centuries — women who have helped shape history — as well as nonprofit organizations at the forefront of driving social change.

Fellowships and grants were awarded to 259 women and community projects in 2019-20. In 2020-21 academic year, AAUW awarded nearly \$4M in fellowships and grants.
