## **Co-President's Message from Cathy Trevino**

Happy Women's History Month, AAUW!

It started out as Women's History Day, then week, and now month.

International Women's Day has been honored since March 8, 1911 in Germany, Austria, Denmark, and Switzerland. The United Nations has celebrated it since 1975, but in the US, it took the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women to execute a Women's History Week (leave it to California!). Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the week of March 8<sup>th</sup> 1980, National Women's History Week. The Women's National History Project lobbied, and Congress came on board in 1987 establishing the whole month of March. As members of AAUW we can be proud that our organization was way out in front celebrating the proud heritage of women and assisting them to pursue higher education when few women had the opportunity. AAUW founder, Marion Talbot gave the call to support funding for women's graduate education at \$1 per member which led to Fellowships, and in 1888, Ida Street received a \$350 grant to study early American Indian history.

In 1920, Marie Currie, a groundbreaking scientist, was helped by AAUW to raise \$100,000 for a gram of radium. The 1950's funded scholars who later became the first women college presidents. Author Susan Sontag and Psychologist, Dr Joyce Brothers were recipients. Following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. AAUW raised \$150,000 for African-American women to study African-American culture, civil rights and peace. Our 1975-76 American Fellow, Judith Resnick, made history as becoming the second female astronaut in space. After she perished in the Challenger tragedy, AAUW members raised \$235,000 to fund an American Fellowship endowment in her name.

As we entered the millennium, AAUW awarded \$4million in fellowships and grants for the first time. International Project Grants were established allowing alumnae to return to their home country and work on projects impacting women and girls.

Thanks to the long-standing generosity of our membership, endowments continue to support women in coming generations. **AAUW-CA** branches **donated \$494,000 in 2021** to the AAUW Fund, helping to sponsor scholarships, grants, leadership programs, and our Camarillo Branch membership added to that pot with \$4,201.00 in donations. Thank you to our members who contributed, as requested by AAUW National, to the "Greatest Needs Fund" which supplements programs without the large endowments like mentioned above.

Happy Spring, Daylight Savings, St Patrick's Day, International Women's Day, Speech Trek, and Knowledge Bowl, and don't worry, Be Happy.

#### Public Policy by Kathy Long

March is Women's History Month and Pay Equity Month. This article by AAUW CA Public Policy Committee members, Ginny Hatfield and Shelley Mitchell, captures the mission.

AAUW believes that pay equity and equal employment opportunity are matters of simple fairness. We know that on the average, women earn about 80 cents for every dollar men earn. Started by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996, the goal of Equal Pay Day was to raise awareness about the gender wage gap.

Each year this date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The date normally moves earlier each year as the wage gap closes, as women's average wages rise faster than men's. Equal Pay Day was traditionally a Tuesday in April, but happily, in 2021, the date was March 24, meaning that things had improved. And this year the news is even better – all women in the aggregate will reach parity with all white men on March 15, 2022. Better, but we're still not there.

On June 10, 2021, the Paycheck Fairness Act, which had passed the House of Representatives and amends the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 by providing more effective remedies to victims of wage discrimination based on sex, was filibustered in the Senate on a 49-50 vote. Now is the time to let your elected officials know how you feel about this failure to codify pay equity.

AAUW Branches throughout the country have marked this day with activities that highlight the wage gap. Here are some suggestions for things your branch can do.

Write your representatives in Congress to encourage them to support the Paycheck Fairness Act.
Encourage your local city council or county board of supervisors to issue a proclamation in support of pay equity.

•Wear Red to symbolize that women's paychecks are "in the red" when compared to men.

•Write a letter to the editor of your local paper or offer to submit an op-ed.

•Share a timely post on social media to spread awareness.

•Hold an event on your local campus and offer cookies to women that are proportionately smaller than the ones you offer to men. Also invite participants to become student affiliate members of AAUW.

•Invite community members to an "unhappy hour."

Whatever you decide to do, start planning now. We can't wait for equal pay! 




## What the heck is an "antiquated" oil permit... and why is it on the ballot in June? From Merrill Berge

An "antiquated" oil permit is one issued anytime between 1900-1970 before environmental reviews were required. These old permits allow any number of wells to be drilled, any method of drilling to be used (i.e. fracking, cyclic steam extreme extraction), never have an environmental review and never expire, passing from one oil company to the next.

This map illustrates that the majority of oil and gas permits in Ventura County are "antiquated" permits covering over 127,000 acres of Ventura County farmlands, open spaces and communities.



More than half of the wells drilled in Ventura County are on "antiquated" permits. 3,026 are active or idle, 2,200 are abandoned and aging in place for a total of 5,226 wells on a permit issued before 1970 and permanently exempt from environmental reviews. Over 1,000 of these wells were drilled through or near an aquifer without any requirement for examining environmental consequences. Especially at risk of oil industry petrochemical contamination are the north county communities of Oxnard, Ventura, Ojai, Santa Paula and Fillmore, whose municipal water systems are completely reliant on local water aquifers.

## Antiquated oil permits (continued)

Back in November, 2020, water contamination concerns prompted the Ventura County Board of Supervisors to vote for consistent permits across-the-board to better protect our vital water supplies with modern-day environmental reviews when the oil industry proposed an expansion project or drilled deeper. In response, the oil industry created a political committee, funded with \$1M from Aera Energy and the CA Independent Petroleum Association, and paid signature gatherers to collect enough signatures to put the Board of Supervisors decision to a vote on the upcoming June ballot.

A "YES" vote simply supports the VC Board of Supervisors decision and ensures Ventura County has consistent oil and gas permits that include environmental reviews. Measure A covers the coastal area in Ventura County, Measure B the non coastal areas.

Since this only applies to proposed oil & gas expansion projects or when applying to drill deeper, this will not impact current oil industry employment or productivity. No jobs will be lost, the price of gas will not be affected, oil imports will not increase as a result of this permit consistency so that all businesses play by the same rules.

This is a health and safety issue. Local water aquifers supply more than 400,000 Ventura County residents with drinking water and 85% of the irrigation water used to grow Ventura County crops. A "YES" vote in June will better protect our local water aquifers, the most essential resource of all.


