

One of our very best AAUW Camarillo programs, Women in History, is in serious need of volunteers to "make history come alive" for Camarillo's children. For more than 35 years women from our AAUW Branch as well as mothers, grandmothers, and aunts of school children, along with some "died in the wool thespians," have come out in droves to portray famous women in the schools. This year we have won the green light of the Supt. of Pleasant Valley School District and other principals of various schools in our area to restore the WIH program. We are busy gathering all the scripts, props, costumes and performance schedules. However, we are falling way behind in our efforts to recruit performers. In order to have performances for all five selected women in the PVSD elementary schools the week of March 6-10, 2023, we need a large number of performers. We have also promised to perform in other schools the following week, March 13-17, 2023 which would require approximately the same number of volunteers. We're hoping many are willing to perform both weeks.

This year we need our members to step up more than ever. Our group has many members with years of teaching children; others may have assisted by volunteering in their own children's education. #### **Susan Butcher (1954-2006)**

- Four-time winner of the Iditarod Race in Alaska
- Difficulty with dyslexia and ways she compensated
- The Iditarod and how dogs and musher communicate
- Suitable Costume: anything one would wear to the snow

#### Jane Goodall (1934 – present)

- Discovered many facts about chimpanzees; is working to save them
- Discussion of how she studied the chimpanzees
- Discussion of environmental problems that chimpanzees face
- Suitable Costume: khaki pants or shorts, khaki or white blouse, and sandals

### Harriet Tubman (1820? - 1913)

- Early life on plantation as slave and ultimate escape
- Underground railroad rescues and activities
- Civil war activities and service to others during that time
- Suitable Costume: long dress or long skirt and blouse--AAUW has some to lend

#### Laura Ingalls Wilder (1867-1957)

- Author of the Little House Books which she started writing when she was 65
- Stories of her childhood a time very different from the present
- Suitable Costume: prairie dress or long skirt and blouse--AAUW has some to lend

### Nancy Lopez (1957 – present)

- One of the premier figures in women's golf history
- Well known for her spectacular performances in the 1970's and the 1980's
- Did much to increase the popularity of women's professional golf
- Suitable Costume: tee shirt and long pants or golf skirt

We are offering a WIH Training Meeting to all volunteers on January 31, 2023 from 5:00 – 8:00pm at Dos Caminos School. We will provide each performer with a full script, tips on how to perform, and information on how to obtain all the props necessary. For Laura Ingalls Wilder and Harriet Tubman we will also be offering costumes. ### Public Policy by Kathy Long and Bea Lutterbeck

#### We've Waited Long Enough for Equal Rights

In 1923, Alice Paul introduced the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) to Congress. If added to the Constitution, it would guarantee equal legal rights for all American citizens, regardless of gender. In 1972, the ERA finally passed both houses of Congress, paving the way to become the 28th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

However, the ERA was never added to the Constitution, because Congress also set a deadline. It said 38, or 3/4 of the states, had to ratify the proposed amendment by 1979. It later extended the deadline to 1982. In 2020, Virginia became the final state needed to ratify the ERA – nearly 40 years after the deadline. People are suing to push the ERA through and those pushing to have it blocked. Some states have voted to rescind their ratifications. More are considering doing so. The Trump Justice Department advised that because the deadline had passed, Congress needed to go back to the drawing board.

To settle the issue, last year the House passed S.J. Res 1 -- a joint resolution to remove the deadline. President Biden said he supports the resolution. However, the Senate has not yet voted on it. Frustrated by decades of delay, women's rights advocates are acting with urgency to ensure full recognition of the amendment before the end of the Congressional lame duck session. They are calling on the Senate to finally vote on S.J. Res 1. If passed, the resolution would remove the deadline to ratify the ERA and clear the way for its final inclusion in the Constitution.

Women in the United States have waited long enough for equal rights. Urge your Senators to vote on S.J. Res 1 and to support ratification of the ERA. The **PREGNANT WORKERS FAIRNESS ACT** would help prevent employers from forcing pregnant women out of the workplace and help ensure that employers provide reasonable accommodations to pregnant women who want to continue working. The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act would: (continued on next page)

## Public Policy by Kathy Long and Bea Lutterbeck

#### The PREGNANT WORKERS FAIRNESS ACT

- Clarify that employers must make reasonable accommodations for workers affected by a known limitation related to pregnancy, childbirth or related medical conditions.
- Require an interactive process between employers and pregnant workers to determine appropriate reasonable accommodations, similar to the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- Provide an exemption for businesses if an accommodation imposes an undue hardship on an employer.
- Protect pregnant workers from retaliation, coercion, intimidation, threats or interference if they request or use an accommodation.
- Apply to employers with 15 or more employees and provide protections for both job applicants and employees.

Review the exact wording <u>as stated in the bill's summary</u>. Additionally, the PUMP for Nursing Mothers Act was also included in the Omnibus bill passed by Congress and signed by the President. These two bills have advanced the rights for women in the workplace significantly. Next step the ERA
