Women in History 2024

Women in History is our annual Spring project to take AAUW to the community. Working closely with the schools, we portray historic women using fact-based scripts, costumes and props to bring history to life. Volunteer run, we can use your help—see link below. The following women will be portrayed this year.

Carmen Camarillo (1903-1987) (Grades K-3)

Youngest child of the Camarillo family. The family members have been so influential in our local history. She will tell how her childhood was different than childhood today and discuss her work with the White Horses and her philanthropic activities.

Mary Cassatt (1845-1926) (Grades 3-5)

First impressionist woman painter and best known for her paintings of women and children. She will tell how she had to overcome several obstacles to get training as an artist and to be accepted as one during a time when women were not encouraged to work outside the home.

Bessie Coleman (1892-1926) (ALL GRADES)

First woman of African American and Native American descent to become a pilot and obtain a pilot's license. She will discuss how the overcame barriers of race and gender to fly and how she participated in air shows as a stunt pilot.

Babe Didrikson (1914-1956) (ALL GRADES)

One of the best female athletes in multiple sports. She set Olympic records in the javelin throw and high jump as well as winning 82 golf tournaments. She will discuss the difficulties she had to overcome to achieve success with an emphasis on the value of hard work to achieve goals and the importance of playing fair.

Sylvia Earle (1935-present) (Grades 3 -8)

A National Geographic Explorer in Residence and avid spokeswoman for ocean conservation and marine protected areas worldwide, she will discuss living under the ocean for two weeks, having a record dive in a "JIM Suit" and helping to develop underwater vehicles to explore the ocean. She will also discuss her work developing marine sanctuaries.

Public Policy by Kathy Long (1/2)

As fall is just around the corner and AAUW undertakes our planning session, it's a good time to revisit the basic priorities for Public Policy. We support the mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education and research. We work to sync with AAUW National and AAUW CA for the basic programs for our chapter. Priorities we track include:

Economic Security for All Women Social and Racial Justice for all Members of Society Increased Representation of Women in Leadership Roles Equal Access to Quality Public Education for all Student

Under the public education component, the priority is "vigorous enforcement of Title IX: Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1972 promises equal access to education for all students, and it protects them against discrimination on the basis of sex. Title IX was enacted to ensure: "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." The question for us locally is how are our public education districts performing to the Title IX standards? We will be exploring how best to report on this.

In our national news reports, book banning is front page: over 22 states have enacted at local levels the banning of books; 86 school districts; with a total of over 11600 books banned. In Florida, 41% school boards have banned books on LGBTQ and racial topics. Texas has removed all books on Martin Luther King and suffrage from required curriculum.

Here in California, the Glendale and Temecula School Boards moved to remove similar books from curriculum, only to be blocked by Governor Newsom. In response, AAUW CA has launched a "School Board Project" and asking all chapters to engage in local discussions and develop a position that establishes educational rights protecting instructional materials and students from book banning; freedom of speech and


exposure to world views; advocating for diversity of views and practices; and supporting teacher's professional development and guidance for educators that is culturally responsive to anti-bias and anti-racist. A next step of development and advocacy of a position is to engage in supporting non-partisan school board candidates who endorse these positions. The Public Policy Committee will undertake this project to bring to the full Board for consideration. 1.Mail a check for \$115 payable to "AAUW Camarillo" Branch" to: AAUW Camarillo Branch, P.O. Box 862, Camarillo, CA 93011.

2. Online at AAUW National - my.aauw.org Scroll down to "Don't have an account?" to reset your password and begin the online process using

your email address, not your member number. Once logged in, you will join by selecting 3 membership types: National (\$72), California (\$20) and Camarillo Branch Member \$23 (select CA-0132 Camarillo).

Tips and reminders for the online renewal:

Complete the password reset the first time you login.

- If you don't receive the password reset email, be sure to check your spam folder!
 - The password reset email will come from: American Association of University Women infosf@aauw.org. Subject Line: AAUW Password Reset Requested.
- Make sure to use your email address and not your member number when logging in.
- Use the same email address you renewed with in 2022.
- You can login but account says you're not a member. You have created a new account in error and a duplicate record new member number. National must fix this so please let me know if this happens to you!
