President's Message from Cathy Trevino

February greetings ladies of AAUW Camarillo. We had a very enlightening IBC (Interbranch Council) luncheon in January with Ventura County AAUW members from Camarillo, Thousand Oaks and Simi Valley. The program theme was "Keep Your Bans Off Our Books" and featured three panelists who spoke on a variety of historical as well as present day examples of attempts to censor and challenge books and curriculum. We were given a "call to action" to keep on top of things and not lose sight of attempts to challenge authentic works that represent real lives. AAUW-Ca has a new initiative, The School Board Project, and encourages us to stay vigilant and ensure students are mirrored in the things they read and are taught in their classroom. Please reach out to Kathy Long, our Public Policy Chair if you would like to assist in monitoring local school board meetings and candidates for those positions.

February is Black History Month, dating back to 1976 when scholar, Carter G Woodson's extensive work standing up for Black Americans, led to the chosen time period, Feb. 1-March 1. This month was chosen because it is the birthday of two great Americans who played prominent roles in shaping black history, Abraham Lincoln, and Booker T Washington, and whose birthdays were the 12th and 14th respectively. Although enslaving human beings is against the law in the United States, Walk Free, the international labor organization, states that in 2022, 49.6 million people live in modern slavery – in forced labor and forced marriage, which disproportionately impact Black people. Roughly a quarter of all victims of modern slavery are children.

Be sure to enjoy the 14th with a little extra chocolate and some loved ones around; you deserve it. Be on the lookout for and sign up to help with our upcoming signature programs, Women in History, and Knowledge Bowl, both during March. There is a job for you, no matter how much time you can commit. Kudos are due to Linda Stinebaugh, editor of our Membership Directory. 






Tech Trek Update

The first camp at Stanford University will be phased out due to escalating costs and two new camps will be added this summer. Public Policy from Kathy Long and Karen Sher

Committee Member and OUHSD Trustee Karen Sher reported out: The Oxnard Union High School District Board recently adopted a Resolution in support of the Assembly Bill 1078 which added Education Code section 202, in which the Legislature reaffirms that its laws and public policy support accurate and inclusive education in all of California's schools. The Legislature specifically included references to instructional and supplemental materials written by or featuring LGBTQ+ individuals, or materials that touch on "race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, or other protected characteristics." The Legislature stated restricting access to such materials because they feature or were written by individuals from such groups is discrimination and constitutes censorship in violation of California law and policy. Kudos OUHSD!

TID BITS: There is a group in Ventura County wishing to return to the "old style of voting" i.e. one day voting, no mail in ballots, no drop boxes, hand counting etc. See: <u>https://restorethevoteventura.org/</u> if you wish more information. They have been speaking out at the Board of Supervisors meetings and we would like to have members of the public speak out in support of the VCA (Voter's Choice ACc) as well as in support of our County Registrar of Voters Michelle Ascencion. Michelle is a member and has spoken to our association. It's important to have our voices heard and protect our local democracy. We will be following and engaging on this important issue all year.

REMINDER: TUESDAY MARCH 5, 2024, is the state Primary Election. Vote by Mail ballots go out Feb 5; early voting sites open Feb 5th and Vote Centers open Feb. 24th. The ballot includes Federal, State and Local elections/candidates. Hueneme and Santa Paula have school measures.

FYI: "Starting January 1, all undocumented immigrants, regardless of age, will qualify for Medi-Cal, California's version of the federal Medicaid program for people with low incomes." [Source: ABC News] This change will expand access to healthcare for adult undocumented immigrant women across the state who previously were not eligible for Medi-Cal. AAUW supports access to healthcare as a basic human right and applauds this step forward for immigrant women in our state.
