
Women in History Did It Again!

Public Policy - DOE Closure

We have all heard about President Trump's dismantling of the Department of Education. This situation is still evolving, with the outcome yet to be determined at the local level. We want to assure our community that PVSD is carefully monitoring the potential local impact of these changes.

The vast majority of our school funding comes from state and local sources. Less than 4% of PVSD's funding comes from the federal government for the specific, targeted purposes of Title I and IDEA. Title I provides additional funding to schools that serve low-income students who are at risk of not meeting academic standards. The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act – IDEA - guarantees a "free and appropriate public education" tailored to a student's physical and developmental needs.

By far, the most impactful of the Department of Education programs here in PVSD are the funding streams for Title I and IDEA. The Trump Administration has repeatedly stated that funding for Title I and IDEA will be "fully preserved," and will send the funding to states directly. Both funding streams are allocated by Congress, and reducing or ending them would require Congressional approval.


In addition to the uncertainty of Federal funding for Title 1 and IDEA, concerns have been raised about the role of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion programs in TK 12. This is an area where state and local control have a voice. State Attorney General, Rob Bonta, and the State Superintendent of Public Education, Tony Thurmond released statements in Early February exerting that California schools will continue protecting all students from discrimination. Public Policy by Kathy Long

Public Education is a priority for AAUW National and local and is under attack. We are fortunate to have AAUW member/school Board Trustees keeping us informed at the local level on how our schools are faring with the challenges coming our way. The many Executive orders targeting diversity and equity are making schools question if they can still commit to inclusive education. A "Dear Colleague" letter from the Department of Education warns schools against such initiatives creating a chilling effect that impacts the equality of college campuses. Congress is considering deep cuts to Pell Grants, work-study, and campus childcare — jeopardizing access to higher education for pregnant and parenting students. The Office for Civil Rights in the Department of Education has stopped investigating race, disability, and sex discrimination claims, weakening the protections for students across the country. We must all work be be informed and be advocates for our schools and our students.

April is Sexual Assault Violence Prevention Month and AAUW National joins many groups nationwide calling for the creation of safer communities. Addressing the root causes of this kind of violence is difficult as it involves a multi-pronged approach, including improving street and housing conditions, providing education, and offering support services. We should work to advance policies at workplaces and schools, discuss sexual assault and its consequences with friends and family, and prioritize prevention in our communities. At the state level, in September 2024 Governor Newsom signed eight bills on domestic violence. The legislation created a new victims' services fund using penalties from white-collar crimes and expanded the ability of victims to access restraining orders.

In recent weeks, AAUW National sent an email to all members announcing the National Membership dues increase of \$2 per year over the next two years. Starting April 1, 2025, National dues will increase to \$74 and on April 1, 2026, dues will increase again to \$76.

What does this mean for 2025-2026 membership dues? Members who renew after April 1, 2025 will pay a total of \$117 (\$74 National, \$20 CA and \$23 Branch). Please keep in mind the important work of AAUW especially in our current challenging environment and I hope you will continue to join us in advocating for women and girls not just locally but on a national level.
