Public Policy by Kathy Long

On April 9th, Merrill Berge, Colleen Briner-Schmidt and myself represented our chapter in the AAUW-CA sponsored Lobby Days, via Zoom. Every year, AAUW-CA sets a legislative agenda of about 30 bills that they advance and then select top priority of 3 for the lobby day focus. We then met with the aides from State Assemblymember Steve Bennett and State Senator Monique Limon to highlight the priority bills. We of course took the time to highlight our local AAUW chapter work and thank them for their great work for our county. The three bills we spoke on this year were:

SB 771 Author-Senator Henry Stern, AAUW-CA is cosponsor. This bill clarifies that a social media platform may be liable for civil penalty under existing law if and when its algorithms or AI, aid or abet individual users who are engaging in already unlawful intimidation of others in online spaces. Hate speech is illegal when it threatens others. For example, when hate speech is "brought to the doorstep" of marginalized communities, it is no longer protected speech, but unlawful intimidation, terrorism, and threat. This means you can post flyers with antimmigrant messages on your own physical door or electronic Facebook wall; however when you maliciously post those same flyers on the physical doors of immigrant families, or on their virtual Facebook walls, you are now engaging in intimidating behavior—which is unlawful. This bill calls out our AI companies who may have intentionally been complicit in removing guardrails, turning away from providing safeguards they previously provided for targeted vulnerable communities, and now should be held accountable.

SB 418 Author-Senator Caroline Menjivar. AAUW-CA is in strong support of this measure that would prohibit a health plan or a health insurance provider from denying coverage or benefits to a person based upon their race, color, national origin, age, disability, or sex—including sex characteristics such as intersex traits, pregnancy, and gender identity. This bill would prohibit labeling of a person's appearance and/or actions as problematic "sex stereotyping". It would protect coverage for gender affirming care as endorsed by the American Medical Association and the American Academy of Pediatrics. This health equity and human rights bill aligns California with best practices and medical evidence.



Public Policy Cont'd

AB 579 Author-Leticia Castillo —AAUW-CA OPPOSITION to this bill. Known as "Yaeli's Law", this bill rests on the premise that denial of support for youth self-identity, including refusal to use a child's name and pronouns, or refusal to provide or allow their gender-affirming care, is not harmful and therefore should not be considered child abuse under the law, and, accordingly should not be allowed as a basis for custody or removal decisions. Yet, lack of family support is one of the strongest predictors of transgender youth attempting suicide; suffering mentally, experiencing high anxiety and depression, and are at greater risk of substance abuse and homelessness. This law would state categorically that refusal to acknowledge the child's desire to transition is NOT, by law, a form of child abuse/neglect, and therefore cannot even be considered by Child Protective Services for investigation, and thus never reach a Judge for determination of "harms way." Needless to say, this one has controversy.



In recent weeks, AAUW National sent an email to all members announcing the National Membership dues increase of \$2 per year over the next two years.

Starting April 1, 2025, National dues will increase to \$74 and on April 1, 2026, dues will increase again to \$76.

What does this mean for 2025-2026 membership dues? Members who renew between April 1, 2025 and June 30, 2025 will pay a total of \$117 (\$74 National, \$20 CA and \$23 Branch). On July 1, we may see increases in Branch and State dues. We will keep you posted.

2. Online at AAUW National – my.aauw.org
Scroll down to "Don't have an account?" to reset
your password and begin the online process using
your email address, not your member number.
Once logged in, you will join by selecting 3
membership types: National (\$74), California (\$20)
and Camarillo Branch Member \$23 (select CA-0132
Camarillo).

Tips and reminders for the online renewal:

- Complete the password reset the very first time you login.
