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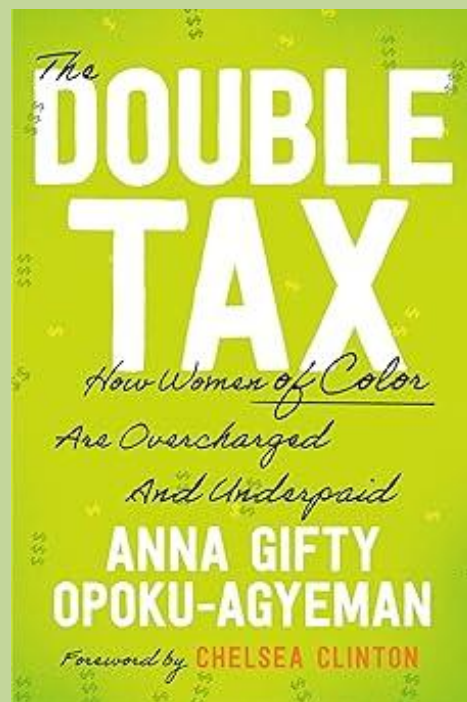

Tech Trek Update, Vanessa

With the new year, we start the cycle of Tech Trek anew. I have requested allotments at UCSB and at Whittier. Due to the generous Ackerman and Haas grants, we have enough money banked to send up to 8 girls to Tech Trek this summer, and do not need to dun you for financial contributions for this project (though your financial support of the Branch at large can have many delightful other uses).

There are other ways you can support this marvelous project, to wit:

- If you have contacts with 7th grade science and math teachers at local schools (especially Title 1 ones) please give me that info. There are a lot of schools in our catchment area, and some have never participated in Tech Trek before. The personal touch might help expand our outreach. This is done in January each year.
- If you have an interest and ability to participate directly in Tech Trek as a volunteer, there are two needs:
 - We need to surface two adult volunteers to serve as Dorm Monitors, which is a 24/7 commitment. Its demanding but very rewarding. The week is June 21 through 27 at both locations.
 - We also need to send a number of adult volunteers to assist with check-in and teardown on the first and last days of that week.

Let me know if you are interested in knowing more about these activities (there is an online application process and some training and clearance hurdles too.)

*** Staying engaged with our TT girls after camp is a recent and important enhancement to the Tech Trek program. If you know a woman who uses/used science or math in her employment, the Tech Trek Alumni Group would be interested to meet her and invite her to address the older girls at one of their monthly meetings. Can you arrange a tour of a lab or other sciencey workspace? Can you advise on college application and entry?

Public Policy by Kathy Long

Combating the Assault on K-12 Education: Two significant actions reviewed regarding the challenges to education. The first, via Project 2025 and the administration changes coming from Washington. The first noted in testimony provided to the Senate Democratic Caucus 12/16/2025, written by Denise Forte, President and CEO of EDTrust, a national nonprofit organization focused on closing opportunity gaps and advancing racial and economic justice in education. Her testimony notes “the unrelenting efforts to dismantle public education by selling it off for parts” with moving the department to the Department of Labor. Challenging their expertise, staffing levels, understanding of processes and laws that govern and protect our students. Additionally, all this done without congressional oversight. She notes the potential long-term damage to minority and disabled children with the lack of planning for transitional programming and support. The response and clear pathway to these raised issues are still out there in our education community.

As we start the new year 2026, and election year, AAUW will have many opportunities to engage with our mission to be advocates for education, to advance policy that enriches opportunities for women and girls. A [December 2025 report](#) released by PACE – Policy Analysis for California Education, a group of education faculty from five major California Universities, has put forth recommendations regarding restructuring the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, currently an elected position.

The Executive Summary includes: “The need to strengthen California’s education governance has never been more urgent,” PACE concludes. “Schools are grappling with deepening inequities, persistent opportunity gaps, and the long-term effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on student learning and well-being. At the same time, the federal government’s retreat from its traditional role in civil rights enforcement, accountability, research and evaluation, and oversight places even greater responsibility on states to lead. California must take bold and strategic steps now to ensure that its governance systems are not only coherent and efficient but also equity centered, transparent, and responsive to student needs.”

While the report advocates a wide rearrangement of responsibilities among the system's many players, its most fundamental reform would place the Governor at the top of the revised organizational chart while converting the elected state superintendent of public instruction into an ombudsman and independent critic, rather than the operational head of the state Department of Education.

The department would be managed by an appointee of the state Board of Education, whose members are named by the governor.

Reimagining the superintendent of public instruction as an independent evaluator and advocate for students "presents promising opportunities to strengthen systemwide accountability," PACE says, "but it also introduces important trade-offs." PACE questions if the office could still be influential if it lacks implementation authority.

We propose that these roles be structured around three core functions of governance: 1. Policy and funding, led by the governor; 2. Implementation and capacity development, overseen by the California Department of Education under a director appointed by the State Board of Education; and 3. Evaluation and system accountability, for which the state superintendent of public instruction would be responsible. A governance realignment of this nature would require legislative action but not a constitutional amendment. Such a shift would clarify lines of authority, reduce redundancy, and strengthen the overall effectiveness and coherence of California's education governance system."
